Hybrid Music Education Programs





Education Through Music-Los Angeles (ETM-LA) integrated its in-school music programs for under-resourced and historically marginalized communities with the mission to provide and promote the implementation of music into the curriculum of our partner schools in order to enhance students' academic performance, self-confidence, creativity, and general development. This year, our faculty utilized virtual and in-person learning to keep the music playing in our classrooms.

ETM-LA provides each of our partner schools with a 45-minute weekly music class on a yearlong basis. These classes provide an assortment of musical disciplines including general music, orchestra, concert band, rock band, music technology, and choir. The programs at each school are tailored to meet the needs of each respective population based on the vision of the school's principal, with the guidance of an ETM-LA consultant or mentor. Students at all partner schools performed in two virtual concerts to showcase their musical learning in the fall and spring semesters.

Professional Development



In the 2022 school year, ETM-LA continued its commitment to professional development, providing over 100 hours of mentoring and training for teaching professionals. Our dedicated teachers and instructional supervisors engaged in high-quality training sessions in October, January, February, and August, enriching their skills and knowledge to better serve our students.

A highlight of the year was our intensive week-long Summer Academy held in August, where educators came together to explore culturally relevant teaching strategies, classroom management techniques, student engagement methods, and curriculum design practices. Led by guest presenters Dr. Ric Alviso and Keith Terry, alongside our Program Department and Faculty, workshops covered a wide range of topics aimed at enhancing teaching practices and fostering authentic connections with students and communities.

As we reflect on a year of growth and learning, ETM-LA remains committed to empowering educators and amplifying the voices of our students and communities through ongoing professional development initiatives.



Year In Review

September 2021

ETM-LA Begins Music Programming for its 16th Year, reaching 40 schools and over 18.500 students.

December 5, 2021

The TODAY Show Visits ETM-LA partner school, McKinley Elementary, and spotlights the positive impact music education has had on the students and community.

May 5, 2022

Premiere of the 12th Annual Music Unites the World Festival. This virtual concert showcased student ensembles across Los Angeles, along with guided at-home music activities and guest performances.

As part of their 100+ hours of professional development, ETM-LA Teachers attend a week long summer training to continue their growth as educators.

ETM-LA releases a Two-Year External Evaluation examining the effectiveness of the ETM Program Model.

Nearly 100 Students join ETM-LA online for a virtual summer music program. Activities included music therapy sessions, jazz and blues exploration, and more.

Your Song Saved my Life - ETM and Sing 2



Illumination, **Universal Pictures**, and **Republic Records** partnered together and provided a spotlight to support Education Through Music's national model, and featured ETM-LA and some of its students in the music video for U2's "Your Song Saved My Life", the first release from the *Sing 2* Original Motion Picture Soundtrack.

Director **Aya Tanimura** (**Katy Perry** "Roar," **Alessia Cara** "How Far I'll Go) created a moving video that features 5 real-life students who have benefited from music education provided by ETM-LA. It details the stories of these students and how music has changed their lives. "Any negativity around me; anything that worries me [or] makes me anxious, that just goes away when I play the trumpet or play with my bandmates." said student **José Santiago**.

Sing 2 Producer & CEO of Illumination, **Chris Meledandri**, said this about ETM, "Through its incredible programs, Education Through Music makes dreams possible for children...across the country, elevating the minds and spirits and futures of young people. We could not be prouder to join forces with them and support their critically important work, however we can."

Music Unites the World Festival



ETM-LA's 12th Annual Music Unites the World Festival premiered virtually on Facebook and Youtube on May 13, 2022, with an encore presentation on May 14. The festival featured interactive lessons, including a percussion class led by **Arthur Thompson** (*Dave Koz*) and a Japanese taiko drumming performance and workshop by **TAIKOPROJECT** (*The Music Center*). ETM-LA's ensembles showcased performances of music from around the world.

Essay award winners **Joshua** (Grade 6) and **Eloise** (Grade 8) shared excerpts of their writing, reflecting on music's capacity to unite and empower. Celebrity guests, such as **Colleen O'Shaughnessey** (Voice of "Tails" from *Sonic the Hedgehog, Digimon*), Emmy-winning Music Director **Rickey Minor** (*American Idol, Stevie Wonder*), and Composer **Pinar Toprak** (*Captain Marvel, Fortnite*), offered their congratulations. The festival concluded with a special performance of "It Starts With You," composed by Songwriting Award Winners, **Chris Artley** & lyricist **Michelanne Forster**, uniting students from across LA County in a powerful demonstration of the unifying power of music.

ETM-LA on the TODAY Show




As a part of their Once in a Lifetime series, the TODAY show visited ETM-LA's partner school, McKinley Elementary, to see how the music program has transformed the once under-performing school. Erin McLaughlin sat down with principal Monique Pugh to discuss her perspective on the program's influence. "I find that music primes [a student's] brain for learning, it settles their spirit, and gets them in the right frame of mind."

Music Teacher, Naju Kim, has been teaching music at McKinley through ETM-LA since they brought in the program in 2015. He had this to say about his relationship with the school and its students, "For many of my students, music class is an outlet – a safe space where students develop not only musical skills, but also skills for life. Through music, my students learn to find their voice, express themselves, and engage in the creative process."

2-Year Music Program Evaluation

In January 2022, Education Through Music-Los Angeles released the results of its two-year External Evaluation Study. Published by Evaluation Specialists, this evaluation is the first of its kind in California that holistically examines the effectiveness of the ETM® program. The study combines rigorous design elements, adds new knowledge to the field, and helps establish a stronger evidence base for a sequential, comprehensive approach to music education in public schools.


Key Study Highlights



ETM-LA Teachers at a new partner school report...

- Over time, ETM-LA students exhibited stronger social emotional learning behaviors more often than students receiving intermittent music programming.
- After two years of music as a core subject, 92% of ETM-LA Teachers said their students were engaged in learning.

ETM-LA Students Understand The Feelings Of Peers More Often*


(Percent of teachers saying most or all of the time)

Teachers attributed improvements in eight areas of student development to ETM-LA programming.

As a result of ETM-LA programming, students demonstrated behaviors such as improved engagement in learning, working well with others, and using effective strategies to resolve conflict.

They reported that, over time, ETM-LA students exhibited these behaviors **more often** than students receiving intermittent music programming.
